A Message from the Rector

It seems like an age since we arrived here in Skegness but it has only been 9 months. We arrived in August but I took up my post in September. We have lived for many years on the coast in Cleethorpes and Scarborough and they all have a rhythm to their life with quiet winter seasons and then bursting into activity in the spring and summer with the arrival of all the visitors.

Last month my wife and I went to Sicily for our holidays. It is a fabulous place for a holiday. We went to Giardini Naxos and then Cefalu. Both are coastal towns with one being on the West Coast and the other on the North coast. In both places the people were very friendly and helpful. From Cefalu we went on a coach trip to Palermo the capital city. It seemed strange to be driving up what seemed to be a back street and through the local fish market. We were literally driving through the middle of the fish market with people having to move out of the way so that the coach could pass. The coach station was near to the top of the hill but we had to get out and walk the last couple of hundred meters up some steps and into an ancient square. There was a fairly ordinary looking church on one side of the square but when you went inside it had a definite wow factor. The church walls were covered in 4 tons of gold leaf and there were some wonderful works of art. At the far end of the church there was a huge lcon of Christ holding out his arms in welcome and looking out on all the people in the church. It was breathtakingly beautiful.

Palermo is on the coast and welcomes visitors from all over the world and its people are warm and welcoming. The churches were fabulous and the people who were looking after them were very proud to show off their churches. I think that the people of Skegness and Ingoldmells are friendly, warm and welcoming and certainly that is what my wife and I have found since we moved here. Our churches are also warm and welcoming and fabulous in their own unique ways. We do have some beautiful churches, we may not have the 4 tons of gold leaf but we do have a warm welcome so if you are visiting this area let me offer you a warm welcome to all five of our beautiful and very historic churches.

All In The Month of July

It was:

300 years ago: on 17 July 1717 that Handel's Water Music was performed for the first time, on a barge on the River Thames in London. King George I sailed in the royal barge to hear the music, and many other boats followed.

200 years ago: on 18 July 1817 that Jane Austen died. Her novels have made her one of the most widely read and loved writers in English literature. Her books include Sense and Sensibility, Pride and Prejudice, Mansfield Park, Emma, and Persuasion.

100 years ago: on 31 July – 10th November 1917 – that the Battle of Passchendaele (or Third Battle of Ypres) took place in Belgium. It was one of the greatest disasters of the war for both sides. Casualty figures were enormous, but the Allies were better able to bear the heavy losses as the war continued.

Also 100 years ago: on 17 July 1917, the Royal Family changed its name from the House of Saxe Coburg Gotha, to the House of Windsor.

Also 75 years ago: on 31 July 1942 that the charity Oxfam was founded in the UK (as the Oxford Committee for Famine Relief).

70 years ago: on 09 July 1947 that Buckingham Palace announced the engagement of Princess Elizabeth to Lieutenant Philip Mountbatten.

65 year ago: on 26 July 1952 that Eva Peron (Evita), First Lady of Argentina, died.

60 years ago: on 06 July 1957 that John Lennon and Paul McCartney met for the first time at a church hall in Liverpool, where 16-year-old Lennon was performing with his skiffle group, the Quarrymen. I5-year-old McCartney joined as a rhythm guitarist shortly afterwards, and the pair went on to form the Beatles.

50 years ago: on 01 July 1967 that the European Economic Community, the European Coal and Steel Community and the European Atomic Energy Community merged into a single organisation. Many people regard this event as the creation of the European Union.

40 years ago: on 01 July 1977 that British tennis player Virginia Wade won the ladies' singles championship at Wimbledon. (She remains the last British woman to do so.)

30 years ago: on 29 July 1987 that Margaret Thatcher and French President Francois Mitterand ratified the Treaty of Canterbury – the agreement to build the Channel Tunnel. (Work began 15 December.)

20 years ago: on 01 July 1997 that the sovereignty of Hong Kong was transferred from the UK to China.

Also 20 years ago: on 20 July 1997 that the second IRA ceasefire came into effect in Northern Ireland. This led to the signing of the Good Friday Agreement in May 1998.

10 years ago: on 01 July 2007 that smoking was banned in all enclosed workplaces in England.

We All Make Mistakes

There are many wrong ways to hit a golf ball and, in my playing days, I tried most of them! For someone who once managed the elusive hole-in-one, I used to wonder if I would ever get it right for the full eighteen holes – free from mistakes.

It's the idea of the inexcusable mistake which can haunt you, especially when it comes to faith. Traditional teaching has it that it was just the one mistake in the Garden of Eden that led to the downfall of the human race – Adam giving into temptation, making the calamitous move, failing to take up a proper stance on the tee if you like, and slicing the ball into the rough.

And what a decision that was! – not just out in the rough, but probably out of bounds, sentenced to endless ages outside the garden; and his children down to the last generation forbidden from enjoying the fruit that once was his. A tough umpire if ever there was one. Either that or a game with particularly unforgiving rules.

You can trace that thinking down the generations; just one shortcoming supposedly puts us on the wrong side of God; just a single slip make keep us forever outside in the cold, denied the beauty and calmness of Paradise. A picture of a strict, stern, unforgiving God, complete with a terrible frown begins to emerge; a being who demands complete and unquestioning, absolute obedience on pain of eternal persecution. I think that picture would probably keep me awake at night if it wasn't for the story that Jesus told of the Prodigal Son (Luke Chapter 15). After living a completely unruly life, the son, brought to his lowest pint, returns home expecting his justly deserved punishment. Instead, the father rushes out and makes a fuss of him. The wrongdoing is not forgotten, but what shines through is the love and the forgiveness of the father for his rebellious child.

Afterwards, though the prodigal son will still have to go and make his way in the world, it will be with the love of his father behind him. That's the sort of God Jesus told his disciples about – the sort of umpire who is more concerned for the players than some of the game's unforgiving rules.

Bearing in mind the way most of us play the game, that's a comforting thought! Reverend Christine Anderson

Neighbourhood Development Plan – Can you help?

With the help of the local community Skegness Town Council is developing a Neighbourhood Plan for the area. This plan will give communities direct power to develop a shared vision for the neighbourhood and shape the development and growth of Skegness. Neighbourhood planning provides a powerful set of tools for local people to ensure that they get the right types of development in their community.

The Council has decided to start the development of a Neighbourhood Plan. During the year, the geographic area was approved by East Lindsey District Council and the Council has sought tenders for professional consultancy to assist the Town Council with the consultation and development of a plan. It is likely that this will take about two years to complete. The Planning Committee has appointed a Steering Group to take this forward and bring recommendations back to Council.

The key to a successful plan is the involvement of the local community to identify local issues and shape the plan. Are you interested in helping shape the future of Skegness through Neighbourhood Planning? If so please contact the Town Council and look out for the upcoming community engagement events.

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
