## **Epiphany**

On 06 January it's time to take down the Christmas decorations but Twelfth Night is also known in the Church as the Feast of the Epiphany. What goes on depends on the church you go to. The Greek Orthodox Church marks the baptism of Jesus in the waters of the River Jordan. In our more traditional churches, the figures of the Wise Men are put in the stable. (Matthew chapter 2 verses 1-12). They are traditionally thought of as the first believers in Jesus who weren't part of the Jewish faith. They were the outsiders, the odd men out. Yet the Wise Men in their fine dress, expensive gifts and different coloured faces, are symbolic of every nation on earth. As we gaze upon them are we mindful of strangers that come to us, not in rich robes, but in the poverty of contemporary outsiders: the refugees and asylum seekers from many nations, those tired of hypocrisy and disillusioned about political power-mongering; the young who want a star to rise in their lives that is worth following even though the journey may be difficult; the old and middle-aged who still dream of something more to enlighten them?

The journey of the Wise Men reflects the spiritual journey of many people. They followed a star from their corner of the earth and found Jesus in the most unlikely of places; and for many of us that journey is just as uncertain. We are forever looking for purpose and meaning in life. The challenge facing us is to find and follow our star. It can be a lifelong and hard, but joyous journey. The Wise Men encourage us to continue our quest.





#### Air Raid on Skegness Town Centre - January 1941



May Hill wrote this entry in her diaries on 20 January 1941, when living in Anderby Road, Chapel St Leonards, near Chapel Point. Family members mentioned here are Coastguard husband Will and their youngest daughter Jean, a pupil at Skegness Grammar School.

On Saturday afternoon a German plane dropped I3 (approx) bombs at the sea end of Lumley Road. One fell on the Tower Cinema staircase but did not cause many casualties. I have heard one or two people were killed. Butlin House and Frearson's [solicitors] Office were hit and a Bank demolished. The relief bus for Chapel was hit, empty, fortunately the full bus was behind. I think debris from the

Tower Cinema fell on it.

[Aside added later: It had not left bus' station after all. Some of the bombs were dropped in the roadway and Jean thinks there is one unexploded. She has heard too that Mr Charles of Charles' Café has died of shock tho' not hurt. His café was damaged.

Another aside added later: Mr C was pierced with glass.]

It was about 4.15 p.m. Jean and I were by the fire after she had got home from skating. We heard the bombs very distinctly. Father was on watch. They thought it was someone running up the [Coastguard watch-box] steps. It passed over Chapel on its way. I am very nervous with Jean going to school but do not want to upset her.

Some further updated details of the air raid and its outcome are as follows:

The Tower Cinema was hit by one bomb, but three hundred children at a matinee escaped injury. (See 'Skegness at War', Marjorie C Wilkinson, Cupit Press, Horncastle 2007, p 11.) The National Westminster Bank, on Rutland Road/ Lumley Road corner, was badly damaged but not demolished. The manager's wife and daughter were killed.

Charles Abraham Hershberg (of Charles' Café) died on the day of the raid.

Owen Kenrick Morgan was injured at nearby Rutland Road on the same day and died in hospital on 24th January.

Both names appear on Skegness War Memorial in the grounds of St Matthew's Church. (See website www.roll-of-honour.com/Lincolnshire/Skegness.html)

## Mother Teresa 90 years since her work began

Sister Mary Teresa – the future Mother Teresa – arrived in Calcutta 90 years ago this month, on 06 January 1929, to begin working with the poor and the sick.

Born Agnes Gonxha Bojaxhiu in Skopje, Macedonia, in 1910, she was of Albanian heritage but had moved to Ireland in 1928 to join the Sisters of Loreto – formally known as the Institute of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Her father had died suddenly when she was about eight, but her mother was a firm and loving influence on her.

She received the name Sister Mary Teresa after St. Thérèse of Lisieux. After making her first profession of vows in May 1931, she taught at St. Mary's School for girls. Six years later she made her final profession, after which she was called Mother Teresa.

As soon as she arrived in Calcutta she was exposed to the extreme poverty there, and this made a deep impression on her, eventually leading her to start a new order called The Missionaries of Charity, prompted by what she termed a 'call within a call' that she received in 1946, on a train journey from Calcutta to Darjeeling.

Her main objective was to look after people who nobody else was prepared to look after.
