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25 November Catherine of Alexandria, Patron Saint of Young Girls

Catherine is thought to have been a noble girl who lived in the 4th century. She was persecuted for her Christianity, and despised marriage with the Emperor because she was a 'bride of Christ'. According to the legend, Catherine was no push-over intellectually; she disputed successfully with 50 philosophers who were called in to convince her of the errors of Christianity.

Catherine protested against the persecution of Christians by Maxentius, and then she herself was tortured, broken on a wheel (later called the Catherine wheel), but the machine then broke down itself, injuring bystanders. Catherine was then beheaded.

This legend strongly appealed to the Middle Age imagination. Catherine became the patron of young girls, students, philosophers, nurses and craftsmen such as wheelwrights, spinners and millers.



In England 62 churches were dedicated to her, and 170 medieval bells still bear her name. 'Lives', poems, miracle plays, stained-glass windows, panels and paintings have all been attributed to Catherine's honour.

How Armistice Day Began 100 Years Ago

It was 100 years ago, on 11 November 1919, that the first Armistice Day (now Remembrance Day) was marked in the UK. King George V had issued a proclamation calling for a two-minute silence at 11.00am to remember the members of the armed forces who lost their lives in the line of duty.

The two minutes silence was in fact adopted from a South African idea that had spread from Cape Town through the Commonwealth in 1919. The first minute was dedicated to those who died in the war, and the second to those left behind – families affected by bereavement and other effects of the conflict.

The Cenotaph was erected temporarily in Whitehall for a peace parade for Armistice Day in 1920. After a tremendous nationwide response, it became a permanent structure, and in the following years war memorials were created in other British towns and cities.

In 1939, the two minutes silence of Armistice Day was moved to the nearest Sunday to 11 November, so that it would not conflict with wartime production. This tradition continued after World War II. Remembrance Sunday is still marked with a national service and by special services in most churches throughout the country and beyond.

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War ends Family Dairy Business from May Hill's Diaries

On Sunday July 6th 1941, May Hill wrote in her Diary:

Our dairy business has gone with egg rationing I am afraid. The £3.10s from C.G. box is alright whilst the war lasts, I hope, but of course it will finish then and we may have a very lean time. We are licensing the car this quarter but don't know after that.

Subsequently, on Sunday 9th November she wrote:

Father has written to Gavin [used car dealer in Tetford, near Somersby], he wants to exchange this car a Singer 8 for a 10 hp if possible as this is hardly up to the size and weight of 5 men on Preachers Sundays and he does not want to lose the work.

Had 3 eggs from Halls this week-end with a MF [Ministry of Food] stamp on them. They seem beautifully fresh but I seem to have a great aversion to them. Expect we will get used to them in time. I wonder if our trade will ever be able to be worked up again, I doubt it now the packers of eggs have got it all in their hands.




May's hard-working husband Will ('Father' in Diaries) was juggling his time between wartime Coast-Guard duties, collecting local eggs, butter etc. and taking them to Grimsby market from Chapel village. He also ran an occasional taxi service as well as gardening and participating in harvesting. Will with an earlier vehicle, believed to be based on a Ford Model T, probably outside Keal Cottage (or Laburnum Cottage) on St Leonard's Drive.

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
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Word Search



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This month, I'm writing from sunnier climes, having decided to spend a few days riding a horse with a funny name through the Spanish desert! That isn't quite how the song goes but you get my drift. In reality, my mount was called Maiz, pronounced 'Mice' which just seemed wrong somehow. I could have dealt with a horse called Mouse, a misjudged naming perhaps, but Mice was just weird! But the horse in front of me was

called Trucha which translates as Trout so who am I to complain?

I could spend hours describing the incredible climate and beautiful scenery of Andalucia not to mention the joy of taking the horses across the beach and into the Mediterranean for a splash about, but I'll save that for equestrian friends and my family, who have no option but to listen to my (often lengthy) tales of my adventures!

Rather, it was the stay in the lovely hotel that intrigued me, because it reminded me that, as a kid, I used to niggle my mother by asking why we had to set and clear the table for meals, when we'd only be putting it all back on the table a few hours later. The look she gave me all those years ago indicated that to do such a thing would be akin to setting off for hell in a handcart! Even the suggestion that just the salt and pepper might cease their relentless shuttle from kitchen to table was not greeted with enthusiasm! There's a point where even the most bolshy and opinionated youngster recognises the futility of further argument!

Now a mother myself, I can admit that few things irritate me more than people leaving debris on the table after a meal. Along with unmade beds, clothes on the floor and a bathroom that looks as though a tsunami has washed through it.

But staying in this fantastic hotel made me realise that by their standards my early family life was quite relaxed. By 7am, the dining room looked as though a wedding planner had been in. Teaspoons were arranged facing the same way. Cold continental meats and cheese slices were arranged with military precision; bread artfully arranged to attract and tempt. Fruit was cut up in such a way to lure even the laziest eater who usually can't be bothered to deal with difficult items such as melon or kiwi fruit. (Apples were pretty standard though and I'll admit here to snaffling a couple for the horses!) There was also a dedicated egg area where omelettes were prepared to order and bowls of hard boiled eggs both hot and cold. (I was probably the only guest who managed to take one from the wrong bowl only to break an uncooked egg across my salami!) Everything was labelled in three languages just in case you didn't recognise it. My favourite was the moniker given to the full fat milk, which was described as 'milk with scum'! Suddenly, I'm a much bigger fan of semi skimmed!

I genuinely have no idea how many people are needed to start work at goodness knows what time to provide such an amazing display and variety.

And it made me realise that here in Skegness, with tourism vital to the local economy, there

must be hordes of people doing exactly the same thing every day for their visitors. People who must rise before the dawn to make sure that their clients are catered for beautifully and that their environment is clean and welcoming. Such work is rarely recognised but, certainly in my case, appreciated. And I hope that after a busy summer, the autumn is offering all those who work in the hospitality sector some well earned rest.

My holiday over, I'd usually be eagerly anticipating the arrival of winter but with a malfunctioning boiler and a defunct oven, the future is looking a little chilly. Bad mother that I am, I left my children with these problems whilst I frolicked in the sunshine. My mother would never have done that any more than she'd have left condiments on the table between meals! But justice has been done. I may have survived my four feisty days of dangerous desert riding but I managed to break a small bone in my foot by dropping the oven door on it whilst trying to fix. She's trying not to smile!

COMMUNITY BUILDING NAME & TIME CAPSULE

Work is well underway on the construction of the new community building in Tower Gardens. The building is now water tight and is on schedule to open in spring 2020. Thank you to those of you who took the time to enter the competition to name the building. After careful consideration councilors decided on the most popular choice and voted to name the building Tower Gardens Pavilion.

The Council and GF Tomlinsons have been working with primary school children from the Viking School and will hold a ceremony later in the month to bury a time capsule. The capsule will include items to recall this time when the new community building was built.

The time capsule will give the opportunity for future generations to remember Skegness, the people living here and the things that were important to our young people. Hopefully, school children will be able to use what it contains for their social history studies in the future.

A BUSY SUMMER FOR THE TEAM

The council's grounds team has worked hard in the memorial garden and St Mary's Cemetery. The area is now looking immaculate and credit is due to those members of staff who have looked after the areas over the summer.

The grass cutting team has had a successful second season and will be challenged further next year as further parcels of land come over to the responsibility of the Town Council through the ongoing asset transfer.

Wolsey 18/85

In 1968 my father was promoted to Sales Manager and as part of his package was allowed to choose the make and model of his company car. There were two stipulations. Firstly the top limit for the purchase was £1000.00 and secondly the car must be manufactured in the UK.

Both these things seem a little strange to us 60 years later; firstly that a prestige car could cost so little and secondly that it must be British. Today many of the up market cars are German such as Audi, BMW or Mercedes. Dad chose a Wolsey 18/85. This version of the BMC 1800 was the flagship model and boasted leather seats, walnut dashboard, plush carpets, hydrolastic suspension and even a radio. It was the third and largest offering from Sir Alec Issigonis of a transverse mounted engine, front wheel drive car and the big brother to the Mini and the 1100/1300. This layout with the wheels at the four corners of the car, allowed a much roomier cabin to accommodate the passengers and in the case of the Wolsey, in considerable comfort and luxury. The smell of leather was amazing. The 18/85 badge stood for an 1800 cc 4 cylinder engine which produced 85 BHP and was also a homage to an earlier Wolsey model produced from 1938 to 1947, though this car was completely different, it still kept a "family" name.

Shortly after getting this car we motored to Pembrokeshire for our holiday. The car was stuffed full with dad, mum, my two sisters and me plus the boot full of luggage for a two week vacation. Just five miles short of our hotel we stopped for some road works and after about a minute of being stationary, we were hit from behind, at great speed, by a mother driving her daughter home. She claimed she was distracted by the child and did not see that traffic had stopped and ploughed into us, without touching the brake. Luckily no one was hurt, but her car was a write off, the whole front end completely smashed to pieces. Ours was not that bad, as the boot was crammed full of stuff, it had acted like a giant shock absorber and protected both us and the majority of the car. After speaking with the insurance company it was driven away to local dealer and a replacement car was provided. The garage did a fabulous job fixing a new back end onto it and it was ready a fortnight later for us to go home.
