National Charity Launches New Tea Party Group For Older People In Skegness



Contact the Elderly, a leading national charity dedicated to tackling loneliness and isolation among older people, is looking for new volunteers and guests in Skegness for monthly tea parties to enjoy a few hours of tea, chat and good company.

With many older people in Skegness suffering from loneliness, leading UK charity Contact the Elderly is launching a new tea party group for people aged 75 and over to

provide a regular and vital friendship link every month. To help support and be able to launch the group, the charity is urgently appealing for volunteers in the local community to help by sparing just a few hours each month to help with the running of local tea parties — and enjoy a cuppa and cake themselves!

There are also places for guests, aged 75 and above, who live alone and would like some company on a Sunday afternoon. Each guest is collected from their home by a volunteer driver and taken to a volunteer host's home, where they meet with a small group for tea, chat and friendship. The group is welcomed by a different host each month, but the drivers remain the same which means that over the months and years, acquaintances turn into friends and loneliness is replaced by companionship.

To help kick-start the new group in Skegness, Contact the Elderly is looking for volunteer drivers who are able to collect older guests from their homes and accompany them to the tea party each month, volunteer hosts to welcome the group into their homes for tea once or twice a year and a volunteer coordinator to help organise the monthly tea parties.

Contact the Elderly's North Development Officer, Emma McPhilbin, said: "We're delighted to be opening a new group in Skegness. For older people who live alone, Sundays can be particularly long and difficult. These tea parties are great fun for both guests and volunteers, and give people a chance to get together with others and make new friends, whilst eating delicious cakes and enjoying a cup of tea! The monthly events make a real difference to the lives of those in the group and we would encourage anyone interested in volunteering, or those who know of people to whom it might appeal, to get in touch."



In the usual run of things, I'd be getting really excited at this time of year, looking forward to kickstarting the garden into another glorious growing season! But this spring, I face a couple of problems! The first is that I had some serious surgery on my hedge. About ten feet of serious surgery — and I'm still waiting for

that wood to dry out enough to burn. I do recall that in the Sleeping Beauty fable, the prince gets to chop down a fair bit of feisty foliage but never has to face the consequences. Such is the way of fairy stories! Not only does he win himself a fair maid, (though a little on the dozy side), he escapes having to tread carefully over spiky branches and deftly avoids hand laceration in what would, undoubtedly, be an extensive and painful clear up operation. So, I've got myself a vast expanse of pretty wicked looking deadwood about the place.



Alongside that, I have moles! Megamoles judging by the size of their molehills! Where have they come from? Are they vying for county dominance with the pot holes? I knew that I had taken a direct mole hit last year, but only realised recently just how widespread the damage! Mole hills in the fields, mole hills in the park, mole hills appearing in the grass verges next to pavements! No wonder these underground inhabitants used to be called 'moldewarps' or 'earth throwers'. Well, they didn't come from Ireland, that much I know. Because Ireland is the only place (other than the Arctic) that has no moles! You'd think, for an animal with a passion for tunnels, the Irish Sea would pose little problem — but no! Apparently these ratty batty creatures

are supposed to favour wooded hilly districts in the north and west so surely they can't be happy here in Lincolnshire? So what to do about them? Jumping on their earth mounds makes me feel better but is unlikely to provide any practical deterrent to the moles. Professional catchers were easily found until fairly recently but it became illegal to poison them in 1996 and since then mole populations have soared. The internet offers a few DIY solutions – such as sinking traps into their motorways. Motorways! Moles have motorways? Oh yes, they can dig at a rate of 15ft per hour, which is a pretty good rate of progress. And then these little critters run backwards and forwards all day, eating worms, larvae and slugs. To be precise, a mole needs to eat half its body weight in food each day! And if it goes more than a few hours without food, it'll die of starvation. (Actually I can empathise with that!) And worse, it's just coming up to the breeding season! I am staring despair in the face here.

I bought, and awaited, with mounting hope, a pair of solar powered deterrents; oversized drawing pins for the lawn which vibrate (moles don't like that) and buzz at regular intervals. They didn't do either of those things; wrong kind of sun apparently. So what does that leave? Fox urine, bloodmeal or bonemeal — all pantry items naturally! Not! Maybe I'll just let nature take its course. I'll ignore the earthy construction chaos outside the window, and I'll write a proper modern times fairy tale about a handsome prince who not only disposes of his own green waste but has magical mole banishing superpowers. Now there's a thought!

We now live in an 'impatient' world, where the technology of the 'Snapchat' age has sped up the pace of life and our communications with fellow man.

Billions of images are changed, cropped, distorted and disposed of in the blink of an eye - then discarded, sent, deleted or shared in the most nonchalant and disposable of ways - and this can diminish their impact and influence. Perhaps, subconsciously, we no longer take enough time to really think about the beauty of what has been framed?

However, the power of images and the skill of harnessing beautiful images (particularly

of people), is the story of how this exhibition came into being: Back in 1999, whilst walking along Drummond Road, in Skegness, I was drawn to an original black-and-white photograph of a beautiful lady, entitled 'Patience' in a junk shop window.

The image, along with several hundred negatives, photos, photographic equipment and more personal items were being offered for sale as part of a house clearance after Alec Manning's death. As a photographer myself, I realised that many of the images were not only beautiful works of art, but an important social/historical document that should be preserved and I was horrified to learn the items would have been thrown away had no interest been shown.

Cataloguing the collection of over 1000 black-and-white negatives, (all shot on 120mm film) and digitally scanning and printing them with the absence of a darkroom was and still is, an arduous task.

Seen on display is only a fraction of the collection, with an emphasis on people, as opposed to recognisable local landmarks in Skegness.

Most of the images have never been seen before today, with only a handful ever being printed for exhibitions back in the 1950's.



inspired by Alec Manning

Despite appeals in the local press, I know little about Alec, other than he was born in Nottingham on 7 August, 1914 (just days after the outbreak of the First World War) He served as an airman in the RAF (No. 957144) from August 1940 until October 1945 and after release in 1945, he had an insurance business at 21 Algitha Road in Skegness. He passed away in 1998 at the age of 84.

I never met Alec and I couldn't even tell you what he looked like - but what I can tell you, is that he had a passion, like myself, for photographing people and after first discovering 'Patience', I wanted to know more about the woman in the image and the man behind the camera!



Clearly, Alec's work took 'Patience' and he made time to reflect on and photograph the most innocent of images, often un-staged, which are frequently the most beautiful - albeit, taken with skill, art, thought, timing and flair.

Barratt Court Boosts Rotary Defib Bid!

A donation of £1500 from the Residents Association at Barratt Court, Skegness has significantly aided the Rotary Club in achieving their goal of saving lives by providing public access defibrillators throughout the town.

The Barratt Court money has been raised through organised raffles, the generosity of local residents, and regulars at their Central Café. The Resident's Association chose to invest the money, in memory of the late Mrs Pam Dickens, into a facility that will not only benefit Barratt Court, but also the wider community. Their defibrillator will be located on the exterior of the building and will be accessible 24/7.

For the Rotary Club of Skegness, this is an ongoing project. Working alongside LIVES, they have been raising money to provide and install defibrillators in strategic positions throughout the town. Ten have been bought and installed in the last year, with Barratt Court, Lucky Strike and Seathorne School scheduled to benefit soon.

Defibrillators? Who needs one of those? We all do, or might do! Defibrillators save lives – increasing survival rates post cardiac arrest from 6% to 74% used promptly and when combined with CPR.

For the past year, Radio Lincolnshire has been promoting CPR training following the collapse of one of their young newsreaders. Recognising this need for tuition, the Rotary Club and LIVES have organised comprehensive training for 160 children from 8 schools in Skegness in both defibrillator operation and CPR and this will happen on Tuesday 20 February.

The Rotary Club fundraising forged ahead with the popular Swimarathon on Sunday 25 February at Fresh Fitness, Richmond Drive, Skegness. Teams of up to six members swam in relay for 55 minutes and all were encouraged to bring supporters to cheer them on! 




