A Letter From The Bishop Of Grantham



Dear Friends

On the 8th of this month, the people of the United States of America will go to the polls to elect their President. The campaign thus far seems to have been hard fought. The commentary that I have read suggests that both main party candidates stir strong emotions and opinions. I am not going to venture to predict the outcome, nor to share my own thoughts about which candidate I would be more likely to back, were I eligible to vote.

I am, however, going to invite the people of greater Lincolnshire to pray for the people of the United States: for the guidance of the Holy Spirit in the decisions that they have to take and for the wisdom of the Holy Spirit for whoever may be elected at the end of the campaign.

As I am growing to know and to love the communities of the Diocese of Lincoln through my privileged role as Bishop of

Grantham, I think I am recognizing a pretty widespread pride in local identity. I have talked to many people who have lived all their lives on one street in one village, and who are delighted to have done so. Local matters in Lincolnshire.

But local doesn't mean 'parochial', I don't think, and I have had many conversations with people who balance being fiercely proud of their own community with a genuine interest in the affairs of the wider world: compassion for the Syrian people, for instance, or clear views about the international economics of farming, fishing or manufacturing.

It is quite possible to learn from each other, to grow to value each other more deeply, and to be concerned for each other, without necessarily ever wishing to travel too far from one's home or place of birth.

There are many examples in Jesus' teaching and ministry of the ways in which he sought to help people to grow in love and to recognize the things that they share with each other. Many of the challenges that he issues invite self-reflection and repentance – key stepping stones on the road of love. And in St John's Gospel, Jesus describes himself as a vine with many branches, with the Father as the gardener.

The vine of God extends across time and across place, drawing us into relationship with our Creator and our Saviour, and with each other. As members of the vine we can be pruned and we have the capacity to bear fruit.

This month, whatever our personal circumstances, whether we have always lived in one place or have travelled widely, may we try to find time to reflect on the fact that through faith all can be members of the vine of God, and can be both sustained by our membership, and changed by it. Moreover, may we be generous in our praying, for surely someone will be generous in their praying for us, someone whom they have never knowingly met, but whom they know to be part of the Lord's vine.


The God of Advent waits for us, not as we might expect, in splendour, but as unthreatening as a child, as a stranger looking for friendship.



CHARITY SINGLE FOR BOMBER COMMAND

Recognition – Remembrance – Reconciliation are words that sum up the release "Tears of the World" available and released on Remembrance Day 11th November 2016.

This is certainly a single with a difference, a superbly produced track with a Simple but highly emotive message about the harsh realities or War, written by Jim Dooley of the 70's pop group The Dooley's and sung by new contemporary vocal group the YoungStars.

The YoungStars who comprise of 17 Lincolnshire based school children are a group formed with the intention of raising funds for the Bomber Command Memorial that is being developed in Lincoln, the centre has a 31 metre memorial spire which can be seen on the Lincoln landscape from miles around.

The International Bomber Command Centre is an ambitious project to ensure that those who gave their lives for the freedom of others are remembered. It has four key aims.

- To remember the thousands of air crew from across the world who were part of Bomber Commands efforts during World War 2.
- To educate the generations of today and those who follow about the individuals with Bomber Command and the sacrifices they made to preserve our freedom.
- 3) To allow individuals from across the world to discover more about Bomber Command, those who served in it and their lives and experiences as told by letters, diaries and memories.
- To tell the stories of those affected by the Bombing campaigns across Europe.

Once complete the International Bomber Command Centre will include a Peace garden, Exhibition Centre, Digital Archive as well as special walls of Remembrance that will list all the names of the 58,000 people who lost their lives during World War 2.

So here we are! November again. And that means Christmas! Trust me it really does. Only those of an age to possess a chocolate advent calendar can seriously believe that Christmas happens in December. Or, more to the point, it's only because the rest of us know what's coming, that Christmas happens any time before next March. Ask any parent, teacher, retailer, restaurateur. I freely admit that I am a 'dead line junkie', a 'last minute Lucy like no other', and that the surge in internet shopping

has given me just one more reason to be biting my nails to the quick on Christmas

Eve whilst waiting for a delivery van. But even I have realised that if I haven't written any

Christmas cards before the clocks go back at the end of October, it'll be a not happening event.

So, it's about this time of year that I have a serious chat with myself and vow to do better this time around. And I thought I would share it with you. I stand true amazed at those who have done their shopping, wrapped their presents and pre-ordered their food, all before the end of November. And who then sail carefree through the festive season. These people deserve medals. Should teach others how to do it. Devise a degree course in the subject. My biggest issue is this, if I start a job but don't finish it immediately – it won't get done. Bearing testament to this, is the lovely coat I made last year – buttonless, it's true, and lacking a hem to be honest. But I nearly finished it. Next to it is the beautiful jumper I knitted. Well, almost knitted. There must have been some interruption which caused me to stop. Suffice to say, when I returned to the project and realised I didn't have enough wool, the yarn had become obsolete. I did manage to find one, last, existing ball of the right wool, in the right colour – in Canada. But then the lady lost it, and with it went my will to finish. No follow through you see! And shopping for Christmas is just like that. I start with all good intentions, and when the first round of purchases arrives, I think I've nailed it. Only I haven't, I've only just begun; a fact which won't sink in until it's late, much too late, to do anything about it.

Over the years, I have developed shortcuts, of course I have. With five children, I quickly realised the potential for having them wrap each other's gifts. In principle, this is great, in practise, it causes more problems than it solves. Occasionally, they end up wrapping their own stuff, blissfully unaware, but it's more often the absent tags which made Christmas morning more of a lottery than a celebration. I've changed my strategy now. I don't just ask for a Christmas list, I ask for a computer written Christmas link, one with hyperlinks that take me to the right product in the right colour/size/console. It works, but rather removes the element of surprise.

I'm starting to think my mother has the right idea – she usually does. Just before Christmas last year, she spent a brief spell in hospital. Driving home, she was adamant that we had to divert to John Lewis. Whilst I was racking my brain to discover why anyone, just discharged from hospital, would want to go meandering around a department store, she clarified her concerns, which were that she'd had notification that items she had ordered, had arrived and were waiting for her.

Naturally, I said I would pick them up for her, once I had her installed, nice and comfy, at home. Dressed for a hospital pickup rather than a spot of retail therapy, I think I maybe should have changed my clothes. Rather than turning up at the store in clothes that blatantly invited someone to pin a notice on my back saying 'Penny for the Guy'. Despite sticking out like a sore thumb, I held my head high at the customer service desk in that swanky store where I dutifully handed over my mother's order confirmation. Casting her eye over it, the assistant gave me a wry smile and disappeared into the back of the shop. A few minutes passed before she staggered back into view – laden down with boxes. Not a variety of boxes though. Identical boxes. Eight George Forman grills! Possibly, hopefully, those were all the George Forman grills available in that part of the world. Had there been more, I'm as sure as I possibly can be, I'd have been taking those too. As the other shoppers gazed on with true fascination, I muttered, 'I hope you didn't want a George Forman grill for Christmas' and made a speedy exit. My mother's thinking on this being, 'why waste a good present idea on just one person?' Turns out she was right – the Forman Christmas will be one remembered for all the right reasons. And that's what matters most isn't it? That we enjoy this time of year, all of it, and take away some lovely memories. Those are the best presents of all.



All over Lincolnshire, there is a quiet support network in place which sees people help other parents through some of the hardest times in their lives. It's done voluntarily, free of charge, and the only requirement to receive help is having primary school age children or younger. The organisation behind this amazing network is Home-Start Lincolnshire — a charity which was formed in April after all the local Home-Start schemes across the county came together to reduce their costs and help even more families. Their work is to provide help to local families with young children (11 and under) who are struggling, whatever the reason. They support parents in situations as diverse as isolation, bereavement, multiple births, illness, disability, or who are simply finding parenting a struggle.

Their support is non-judgemental and can be practical or emotional in nature; whatever is needed to help build families'

confidence and ability to cope. This help comes in the shape of weekly volunteer-based assistance in the family's own home; tailor-made support to help the parents work through their difficulties, whatever these may be. Through this service, which is free for families to receive, they aim to empower parents to give their children the best possible start in life.

They currently support over 1,000 families each year through this unique home visiting service, with additional support given through family groups.

A series of events is also organised each year, such as a summer trip and a Christmas party, to provide opportunities for families to share time and experiences and give them a break from their normal, challenging routines.

Apart from the great service offered to the families they support, volunteering for Home-Start Lincolnshire offers many benefits too. As well as the feeling of giving something back and helping other parents and their children through hard times, you will benefit from an initial 40 hour course, continual support and ongoing training. There are also many potential employment benefits to be gained including your volunteering work on your CV.

Skegness Lifeboat Station

In 1990 our new station on the seafront took delivery of a new Mersey Class Lifeboat "The Lincolnshire Poacher," which was a huge leap forward from the previous boat we had at Skegness the "Charles Fred Grantham." The Poacher was twice as fast - 14knts and for the first time all the crew were able to be inside during heavy weather. It was also loaded with, at that time, up to date technology and was a very capable boat in rough weather and an excellent rescue platform.

The Poacher (pictured right) had an expected lifespan of 20 to 25 years, being constructed of aluminium. It is now 27 years old and had a full refit at 20 years, but age is taking its toll. The equipment on board is very dated now and our world leading sea rescue service requires a more up to date rescue platform.

Over the past 6 or 7 years the RNLI has been planning and developing a replacement for the Mersey Class Boat and in 2014 the Shannon Class Lifeboat was developed. This boat has been solely designed and tested by the RNLI and built in the new premises at our headquarters in Poole. From June 2016 all Shannon Class boats are being built there. The build quality is much higher, thus having less faults and it will also be a lot cheaper and quicker to maintain the growing fleet.

Although this boat is a similar shape to the Mersey it is a metre longer and is twice as fast - 28knots, it is also packed with up to date technology and is a world leading sea rescue platform. This boat is not powered by propellers but by 2 water jets which give it the speed and make it much more manoeuvrable, with the aid of computers.

One of our long serving volunteers Joel Grunnill MBE who passed away 5 years ago, left a substantial sum in his legacy to purchase a Shannon Class Lifeboat for Skegness and his surviving cousin April Grunnill is also still helping to fund the new boat. The new Skegness lifeboat was put in the water at the end of September 2016 and is undergoing sea trials at Poole ready for crew training in December 2016. It will be delivered to Skegness at the end of January 2017, when intensive on station training will take place for approximately 4 weeks, until we are classed as S.A.R. "Search and Rescue" capable

The New Skegness Lifeboat is called "The Joel and April Grunnill" and is expected to be in service at Skegness for 40 plus years.

Because the boat is a completely different design and longer, a new tractor and carriage has had to be designed and developed because the old Talus and carriage is very dated and couldn't be adapted. The new system is again packed with technology and reduces the amount of beach crew required to launch and recover, because it is all done with hydraulics. The Shannon trial boat and launch equipment pictured above came to Skegness early in 2016 to ensure it fitted into our Station and to show the volunteers the equipment that they would soon be using. The crew were able to compare the two boats at sea.

The boat, tractor and trailer cost approx. 3.5 million pounds and it is a massive investment for the future of Skegness Lifeboat Station.

There are also proposed future alterations to Skegness Lifeboat Station, such as:

- A visitor experience centre to be open all year round
- A larger and modern souvenir shop on the front of the Station
- A larger boathouse for the ILB and tractor
- Better crew changing facilities
- Larger more up to date mechanics shop
- Better crew Station visitor facilities

All of this work is only possible because of people's generous donations which secure the future of Skegness lifeboat for the next half century.

From December 2016 the Shannon training will be on Station and with the arrival of our boat in January 2017 we will have 2 complete Shannons and tractors. We will still have our present Mersey boat because we are still on call with that until we become competent with the new boat.

The old Mersey has been sold abroad to a country which is developing an RNLI. They are sending their prospective new crew to Poole for training which is income for the RNLI.

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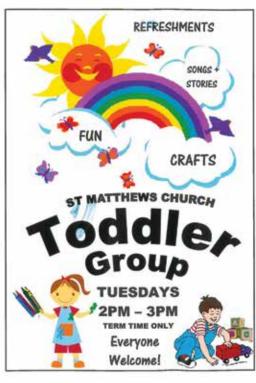
