It is a joy to spend time thinking about our loved ones and what we can do to make Christmas enjoyable for them. There is, of course, the pressure to provide a huge feast for those charged with the cooking and also there is a financial burden of buying food, drink and presents. For some it is a time when all the family difficulties and tensions come to a head. At Christmas time and for a couple of months before we are bombarded by adverts giving us the image of a Christmas that is only obtainable by purchasing a lot of things from their store. So there are joys and stresses with our modern day Christmas celebration. There were also joys and stresses with the original version. We have the story of a pregnant girl having to travel in a not very comfortable method to the village which was where Joseph's family originated. The welcome was not great, although she was family, she ended up in a stable with the animals. A baby born in not exactly clinical conditions. Mary found herself having a child in difficult circumstances. I am sure we can see many likenesses with people's lives today.

If we look past these human joys and difficulties both for ourselves and for Mary and Joseph we can, perhaps, see something of the greatest joy of Christmas. Here we have the opportunity to meet with God in human form who has come weak and helpless as a human child into our world and become one of us. Peaceful Praise On A Silent Night

200 years ago this Christmas Eve a parish priest near Salzburg in Austria and his organist wrote a new carol for the midnight mass. The priest, Fr Joseph Mohr, provided the words in a poem he had recently written. The organist was Franz Xavier Gruber who created a tune of haunting beauty. The carol, Stille Nacht, was duly sung at the service.

We don't know what the congregation thought of it, though I bet someone said, I can't stand all these new tunes!' But the simple words and wistful melody were to become one of the world's favourite carols, translated into hundreds of languages, 'Silent Night' as we know it.

My father told me of his experience in the First World War, when on Christmas Day the British troops heard the sound of German soldiers singing Stille Nacht. They responded with Silent Night, and the sacred words echoed across the blood-stained no man's land. It is a carol that breathes peace, quite unlike the traditional ones that stir us to action – 'O come all ye faithful', 'Hark the herald angels sing'. This German song is about the infinite peace of nativity – Mary pondering her heart all that was happening and the shepherds returning to their fields. The birth of this royal baby went largely unnoticed. There were no crowds, no cheering, no processions. But for two centuries people have sung this precious song of peace to recall that silent and holy night.









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Unless you have a birthday or anniversary this month, December only means one thing - Christmas! And since we've all had the Christmas spirit thrust down our throats since Bonfire Night, it's a total validation of the British spirit that we still have any enthusiasm left for it come December 24th!

identification of 'our customs'; 'our rituals.' I didn't know half of them existed. We usually have two Christmas trees, a real one that smells nice and drops needles carelessly on a tiled floor. (My mother's complaints of finding Christmas tree in the carpet until Easter and beyond always makes me feel very smug in having a hard surface for mine). And a 'pretend' one whose requirement for blue tack reparations and bits of sticky tape increases over the years. I'm told, by my tree decorating daughter, that one tree is dressed thematically and the other with the 'family ornaments'. The latter, I assume, are the bits of tat we've salvaged after complete sets have been diminished by hordes of small children and a veritable zoo of animals. Eclectic but memorable.

On a recent visit to Cheshire, I made the mistake of visiting the John Lewis Christmas Emporium, (it was late August or thereabouts), and I saw the glittering array of beautiful tree decorations available. To my 'bah humbug' mind, it was a case of 'do you want turkey or a blue whale tree ornament with mermaid attached - your choice mate!' But it was very beautiful. It made me realise I need to 'stay in' more - there's genuinely no need for that! Doesn't Christmas cost enough without getting precious about the surface dressing? I usually congratulate myself if I've vanished the ironing pile and got some bleach in the loo by the time the family arrive. And do they care anyway? For all the things I've done in my life, I love, just absolutely adore the fact that all my children want to do at Christmas is spend time with each other, (and me I'd hope!) And as we spend more and more of our lives behind a computer screen or clamped to a mobile phone - time spent with real people becomes increasingly precious.

The whole consumerism element of Christmas has changed too. When I was small, my Christmas list was entirely subjective; I wanted a doll, my best mate wanted a play kitchen. We wished for different things. Then came the 'must have' era - with used notes being exchanged for a second rate Po in a scuzzy layby - tellytubbies being the essential currency for 'that Christmas'. And from that to an era of 'I haven't got a clue' as music, video and books became secreted in mobile devices.

What is left to delight at Christmas beyond the simplicity of being together then? Oh the irony of technological advancement promoting the simplest human values as being the most important! I know that as a family, we're looking forward to a turkey cooked at (time to be advised, but traditionally far later than I originally planned) followed by games, chatter and singing until dessert turns up several hours later. Then board games - cheese to follow, and finally nightcaps varying from Earl Grey to Hot Chocolate.

Television, computers and games consoles won't get a look in this Christmas Day! I only ever buy a TV guide in December. I imagine that I'll look at all the good things in the schedules and put the recorder on for later delectation. And then I forget. And it's not even as though we're talking about video — where you miss half the programme because of schedule changes and become involved in a documentary that you never wanted to watch but in which you become utterly absorbed before it cuts off ten minutes in. Catch up TV means we can all enjoy our favourite entertainment over the festive period, but not necessarily at the time it is scheduled! Leaving more time for the things that matter. And being together is what matters.

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
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A Wartime Home Front Christmas at Chapel Point

The following (edited account) was written on Boxing Day 1940 by May Hill, whose immediate family were Coastguard husband Will ('Father'), daughter Jean (aged 12), elder daughter Rene and their son Ron – who was away from home as an RAF trainee. Emmie was Ron's future wife and Mr A was Rene's future husband.

Our Christmas Day started early. Father was on duty at the watchbox until 2 o' clock am, so our Happy Christmas's were said about 2.15 am. Jean woke up about 6.30. She had insisted on her presents being taken upstairs to look at in bed. It was the first time she had not hung up her "stocking" but she could not wait to see them at breakfast. Emmie's and [Aunt] Harriet's parcels were sealed up. Emmie's were 6 linen embroidered Irish handkerchiefs and Harriet's two hank's with coloured borders and chocs. After going thro' them all, stockings and a Collin's diary from me, a Warnes Pleasure Book for Girls from Rene, and a bag of sultanas and pea-



nuts which I slipped in at the last minute (lucky I did as she said she knew I should put those in), she would go down for Father's present from Rene and I, a cherry-wood tray with cig. bowl and ash tray, and her own which was a leather case with pipe-cleaner etc in for waist-coat pocket. Father admired them and went off to sleep again...

[After breakfast] I got chicken in oven, it was already stuffed, it cost 8/0 alive from J. Jacksons and was not extra fat, weighing only 3½ lbs when ready for oven. Still with brussel sprouts from the garden, potatoes, bread-sauce and bacon, sausage and gravy it was very good. Then we had Christmas pudding and custard sauce (Birds). Mr A and Rene came to dinner, he brought a bottle of grapefruit squash it very refreshing amongst all the sweet things. We had a cup of tea after. Then at 2 Father had to go on watch...



We did not want much tea as we were having supper at 8 when Father came back. Played games after tea and had quite a pleasant evening. Thro' the day I missed Ron very badly and in spite of our fun and quiet happiness it was a hard day for me. I expect he was in all our thoughts most of the time. Jean decorated his photo frame with laurel. No carol-singers, no lights in the black-out no Christmas bells and, thank God no bombs. We have so much to be thankful for this Christmas. What of the next?





You don't have the confidence? Well you won't find it by not playing, and there's an entire band to back you up and help you regain what you've lost.


You don't have the time? Are you sure about that? Rehearsals are on a Monday night at 7.30 and everyone understands that work takes priority when it comes to our performance diary.
