


Skegness East Coast and Wolds Hospitality Association Name New Chairman



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



Preparing for Winter Driving

- I. Check all under bonnet fluid levels and check cooling system for any leaks. Make sure anti-freeze strength is ok.
- 2. Make sure car battery is in good condition & fan belt is correctly adjusted.
- 3. Keep all windows and lamps clean and wiper blades in good condition.
- 4. Make sure tyres have good tread with no cuts in sidewalls and pressure correctly set.
- 5. Carry emergency kit including: Ice scraper, torch with good batteries, small shovel, small piece of old carpet to put under driven wheels if you get stuck on ice or snow, a blanket, hot drink and snack in case you get stranded somewhere.
- 6. Adjust your driving to the weather conditions. Accelerate and brake with care approaching junctions and bends with caution. Keep a safe distance from the vehicle in front of you.




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
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Sylvia's Chocolate Cake

INGREDIENTS
275g (10oz) Caster Sugar
175g (6oz) Soft Margarine/Spread, not low fat.
3 Medium Eggs
I Teaspoon Vanilla Essence
175g (6oz) Low Fat Natural Yoghurt
225g (8oz) Self Raising Flour
50g (2oz) Cocoa Powder
I Teaspoon Bicarbonate of Soda
THE ICING
50g (2oz) Soft Margarine
50g (2oz) Cocoa Powder
325g (12oz) Icing Sugar
3 Tablespoons of Milk (approximately)

In the early 1950s my mother worked as a cookery demonstrator for the Gas Board and demonstrated in their showrooms or in village halls how to cook both sweet and savoury recipes using gas. Imagine the fuss to get a gas cooker plumbed into a church hall especially for a demonstration! That would never happen today. This is the same job which Mary Berry of Great British Bake Off fame did at the same time but she was working for the Electricity Board. Alas my mother had a family and stopped working to bring us up. Mary went on to become a celebrity.

I thought I would share some of her recipes with you in Shoreline.

Grease and flour a 225mm (9 inch) tin and pre warm your oven to 170C/325F. Sift the dry ingredients into a large mixing bowl, add the eggs, marg, vanilla essence, yoghurt and carefully combine all the ingredients until you have a smooth paste. Keep mixing for 3 to 4 minutes to add air to the mix.

Pour the mixture into the cake tin and bake in the hot oven for 55 to 65 minutes. Check cake at 55 minutes using a screwer pushed into the middle, if it has a sticky tip, bake for a few more minutes until the screwer comes out clean. Leave the cake in its tin for 5 minutes then turn out onto a cooling rack and allow to cool fully before icing.

The Icing - Melt the marg in a saucepan, stir in the cocoa keep on a low heat and gently combine, then remove from the heat and stir in the milk and icing sugar until blended and smooth. Place the cake onto an upturned plate and use a spatula to coat it in the icing. Then decorate with whatever you fancy, glacé cherries, white chocolate drops, or any other propriety cake decorations.

If you like you can cut the cake through and spread jam between the layers if you want prior to icing. This makes it even more moist, but is not necessary. You would do this prior to icing. I suggest it is sliced and served with a generous portion of fresh cream.

The Church Of The Nativity: Bethlehem

A PLACE: The Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem is maybe the oldest Christian church in continuous use, certainly in the Holy Land. It houses, in a crypt, the traditional cave where Jesus was born.

A THOUGHT: Matthew Ch. I & 2. Luke Ch.2

Once, when I was travelling alone in Israel, I decided to walk from my hotel in Jerusalem to Bethlehem. It took me less than two hours. So the answer to the question in the carol "How far is it to Bethlehem?" is indeed "not very far." But then it does rather depend on where you start from! And that is a spiritual question and not merely one of geography.

The contrast between Israel and Palestine, relative wealth and real poverty is immense and this difference hits the visitor as soon as you go through the hole in the wall which now surrounds Bethlehem and every other Palestinian community in the West Bank. Tourist coaches swish in and out of Bethlehem scarcely being stopped at the check point. But on the day I walked to Bethlehem I queued with the Palestinian residents who needed two passes and had to give a hand print to exit or enter their community. A disembodied voice shouted instructions over a tannoy and the queue moved slowly, so slowly.

Is it just –this security wall? Does it work? The Israeli Government points out that the number of terrorist incidents in Israel has fallen dramatically. But the Palestinians are now in a ghetto, prisoners in their own land. I sometimes think, especially when visiting the important Holocaust memorial, Yad Veshem, that the Jews learned something from ghettoisation from the Nazis.

So imagine Jesus, born in this place today. In some ways it is not so very different to two thousand years ago. Then there was an occupying power, the hated Romans, with soldiers on the street and brutal treatment handed out to those who step out of line.

Yes, Jesus is born here today. A birth two thousand years ago continues to reverberate today in the lives of nearly two billion Christians. That birth was almost unnoticed but not quite. God gave the heads up to some shepherds minding their sheep in the fields below the hill top town. A heavenly choir was better than a tweat or text to them. World weary travellers from a distant land were also prompted by God's spirit to follow their star and to see and to experience God's love come down to earth. Jews and Gentiles both worshipped the baby.

What did they see? Their eyes saw only a baby, just another baby and yet their eyes of faith gave them a vision of something stupendous, something life transforming.

A PRAYER: FATHER GOD,

As we travel that short distance in our mind's eye to Bethlehem, give us eyes of faith that we might meet with Jesus along our pilgrim path. Be present in our journeying. Help us to open our inner self, our spirit to your spirit. Be born in us today.

With the beach we have and the clean beach awards, we are truly an exceptional holiday or day out destination, with

an advantage that rivals such as Blackpool or Scarborough can only look at with envy.

The beach is a "free-of-charge" attraction that brings people in all year round. Go to the beach on Christmas Day, Boxing Day, New Year's Day, middle of winter, and even if the weather is even slightly "ok" (not raining!), you will find the beach packed with people walking off their excesses of food and drink or walking their dogs. You will find not just locals but people from Lincoln, Sheffield, Nottingham & Leicester there, coming for a day out to walk on the beach and breathe in that pure, oxygen laden fresh air, "blowing away the cobwebs" enjoying what we tend to take for granted. More than one in three UK households are said to have a dog. Our dogs are the luckiest in the country. Not only do we have dog friendly areas on the beach, the whole town is dog friendly. Its' a shame we can't question the dogs themselves about what they think of the beaches but I know our own dogs get way more excited about getting in the car and heading half a mile east than they do about food, which I think is a great compliment!

We personally use the beaches. We can see why Skegness has been so highly praised and are not surprised by the news but also a big "Thank You" to the volunteers and Council who endlessly pick up the rubbish washed in by the tides or left by the odd selfish idiots who treat the beach as a litter bin.

Without the beach and everyone's efforts to keep it clean, we would have nothing and Skegness would not be the much loved resort that it is. Its history scans more than a century since its inception as the Skegness Boy's Brigade Band under the direction of one Mr J Hudson. Sadly, it had to disband at the outbreak of hostilities in 1914 but rose from the ashes as Skegness Town Band with Wilfred Keyworth as its conductor. It now thrives under the direction of Steve Walker, a world class professional trumpet player.

Under his guidance, the band has progressed from being a 'much appreciated' local entertainment to a competitive brass band reaching for the heights, and something of which the town can be properly proud. He has taken the band from the old and expected favourites, through many different genres of music, taking in classical, swing and pop so that there's a programme to satisfy and excite every booking taken.

In the past year alone, the band have provided music for the SO Festival evening finale, the Embassy Theatre, lazy weekends at the Tower Garden and concerts at the Village Church Farm and the Storehouse. They have also been present to welcome visitors to the area by playing at the Skegness Train Station – a move which has been appreciated by many, as both innovative and entertaining.

Faith and Hope

Well over 4 years ago I was passing the hospital and spotted the Mobile Breast Unit. I was prompted to make an appointment even though I was past the age required. I carried on with my life until I was recalled by the hospital. No panic-I felt so calm. I did have a malignant tumour which needed to be removed immediately. I wasassured that I could be successfully treated and really felt confident of my recovery.

The surgeon explained in detail how and what they would do in the operation. I still felt calm and trusted them implicitly.

I had the op and came home less than I2 hours later. I was slightly handicapped but the biggest problem was ironing which was done by friends. I had pre-cleaned my flat and shopped in advance.

I slept a lot and walked a lot and was now able to thank everyone for their kindness from cards, phone calls and prayers.

The next phase was 15 consequent days of Radio Therapy. I was refused transport to Lincoln but a team of cars and drivers arrived much to my neighbour's curiosity (as most of them were men!) The op and aftercare were successful. I was prescribed Tamoxifen daily which has a lot of side effects, but a small price to pay.

Last week I was discharged from Lincoln Hospital and stopped taking the Tamoxifen I am left with 2 tiny tattoos and a very small scar. I knew that whatever happened I would cope but fully realise I am one of the lucky ones I always had Hope and Faith that I would get better and a strong belief in the power of prayer. The moral of my story is-ladies please get yourself checked out.
