

The Gift of Christmas?

Like most people in the weeks before Christmas, I do my best to prepare. I trim the tree, send cards, and make plans to go to family for the Christmas meal. I buy gifts and get them wrapped. But, somehow I, like so many others, am never quite ready. Every year, as Christmas morning dawns, I feel surprised and overwhelmed by the mystery of Christmas - the gift of God's presence in the life of the world.

Children will dream of Santa Claus and the gifts they believe he will bring. For us who are older and sadly maybe, wiser, the magic may have gone. St Nicholas, on whom our story of Santa Claus is based, was a Turkish citizen who heard of a man who had fallen on hard times and because of this poverty may have had to sell his daughters into prostitution. Nicholas, upon hearing the story, put three bags of coins through one of the windows of the man's house, thus saving the family. When we give gifts, we, in some small way, express what God feels – on that first Christmas night, the angels told the shepherds of God's promised gift, wrapped up in a little baby – “The gift to you” said the angels “is peace and goodwill to all”.


Gift-giving began between people, not so much as a way of marking birthdays and celebrations, but rather as gestures of peace making. Gifts are given to make peace; and in Jesus, the babe of Bethlehem, God offers the gift of peace to the world. Sadly this Christmas, like so many in the past, we are swamped by war and violence, famine and homelessness.

Many choose their Christmas cards showing Mary and Joseph escaping violence in Bethlehem; perhaps chosen because this year many will experience the fear of war, the hunger of famine, the reality of being rootless refugees and homeless in this world. These are not the gifts anyone wants.

Christmas reminds us that if we are to live in this crazy world, we must be guided by a vision in which nations stop seeking to resolve their problems by making war. That would be a real gift to the world.

In the end, the best we can do is watch and wait and, perhaps by the grace of God this Christmas, we will catch a glimpse of a great gift – the mystery and the glory of God wrapped up in a crying child.






