Some Surprising Facts About....

Skegness's famous clock tower has a twist to it. If you look at it from the beach it is very slightly leaning to one side, this is because in World War 2 when the Germans were flying back to Germany they had some bombs left so they dropped one which landed in Skegness and the explosion left our beloved clock tower slightly lob sided!

Karaoke is very popular in Skegness, especially in pubs and clubs!

Eighteen forty two was the time when Skegness was referred to as a "pleasant village" according to White's Directory, which states that Skegness only had a population of 185. Today Skegness has a population of 24,876, so it has grown by 24,691 people, or by roughly 13,450%!

Goalkeeping legend Ray Clemence (former Liverpool, Tottenham and England player) originates from Skegness. He made 470 appearances for Liverpool, 240 for Tottenham and 65 for England, he went on to manage Tottenham Hotspur jointly with Doug Livermore for one season then Barnet for two.

N atureland is a lovable tourist attraction on the coast of Skegness, which is well known for rescuing seals when they are stranded on the beach. They give them names, (mostly after someone famous) and look after them until they are well enough to be released back into the wild. They also have many other creatures to see and learn about such as penguins, birds, turtles, butterfly, reptiles like snakes etc. and tropical fish in their mini aquarium.

Earl of Scarborough was a very well to do gentleman in the 1870's as he was the landowner of Skegness at that time. He decided to improve the town and designed plans for new streets and houses which extended to what is now Scarborough Avenue. The area was laid out in a very sensible geometric pattern with wide roads, wide verges and footpaths; all of these are still adequate even for today's traffic.

Skegness was a Roman village, and if you go on the beach or along the marshes you may even find some ancient Roman pottery lying deep beneath the sand.

Skegness attracts a staggering 4 million tourists each year and is very popular with all ages, many who have been coming back year after year.

We are all given the same amount of time, no matter who we are. There are only 24 hours in every day, 168 in every week. Let's use it to make time for God and for one another.

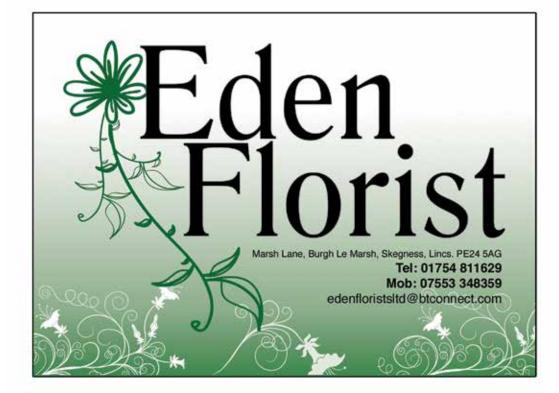

Grave Talk

GraveTalk is a ministry of the Church of England for those of all faiths and doubts. There are signs throughout our culture that people are beginning to talk about death, dying and funerals. The Church of England conducts around 3,300 funerals each week and for generations the church has been helping people prepare for dying, remembering loved ones at funeral services and supporting them on their journey of grief and remembering. We have lots of experience on which to draw.

GraveTalk is a simple way to help people in the community get together and talk about death, dying and funerals in a relaxed easy atmosphere over tea and cake. It has been tried and tested over the past two years and has proved to be successful and popular.

It is a known fact that we are all living in death. From the moment we pass through our mother's womb into the waiting world our life moves toward death. To many this fact is morbid, yet it is a fact of life.

Death surrounds us every day. Light dies and gives way to darkness and sleep. Autumn shows us the process of dying, death slumbers throughout winter and then spring gives way to 'new life' popping up everywhere. Death is a passageway to new life.

Many people do not think about this until someone close to them dies, or when

they have had a close brush with death and been blessed and restored to good health. They are then reminded of their own mortality.

There are many unanswered questions around GraveTalk and that is why funerals matter. For this reason the church has invested in helping those in local communities to think ahead, plan their choices and ask questions in an unthreatening way.

Are you the type of person who would like to plan ahead?

As your local Parish Church, we have organized a session of GraveTalk so that people of all faiths and doubts can take part in open conversation about death, dying and funerals.

This is not a course and although the first session is being held in St Matthew's meeting room, others may follow in coffee shops, residential homes. It is a community based project for local people.

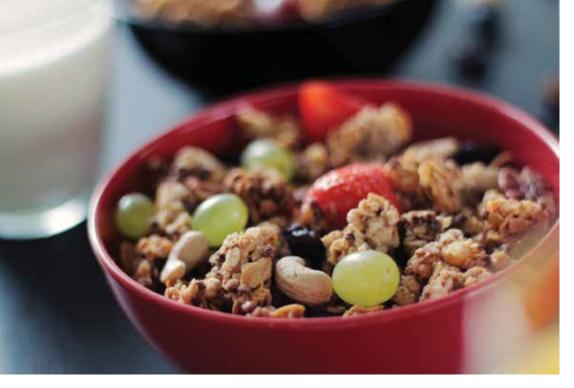

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Fitness Breakfast

Don't skip this one....it tastes great and helps you live longer!!

Supercharge your day and feel full of energy with this tasty breakfast idea straight from the tried and tested Lincolnshire Fitness Recipe book

According to a study by Harvard University, wholegrains such as oats may be the key to living longer – so there's no better time to liven up your breakfast with some new and tasty ways with oats!

Don't be tempted to grab the "quick fix porridges" from the supermarket as they are often packed full of sugar, salt and preservatives and often overpriced. A simple bag of porridge is all you need with nothing added but full of flavour and taste.

Spring is in the air so here is a new way to eat your oats which the whole family can enjoy.

Homemade Muesli

Ingredients

25-30g porridge oats

I tsp ground almonds

I tsp ground flax seeds/sunflower seeds/pumpkin seeds (mixed)
1 tbsp dried fruit (such as dates, apricots, sultanas or cranberries)

150ml skimmed milk or almond/soya milk (or enough to cover the ingredients)

I heaped tbsp of greek/natural yogurt
Big handful of fresh fruit (such as strawberries, blueberries, chopped kiwi, grated apple/pear...anything that's in season or in the fruit bowl!)
I 0g nuts of your choice (pecan nuts work well)
I tsp ground cinnamon (to sprinkle on top before eating – optional)

This is a breakfast which can be prepared in two ways depending on your taste and time :-

The first option is to mix all the dry ingredients together and soak overnight with the milk. This will allow your dried fruit to plump up and become juicy and your oats to soften. You then take it out of the fridge in the morning and mix in the yogurt and top with fresh fruit. This gives you a creamy mix of loveliness!

OR

Second option is to make it fresh in the morning by first putting the yogurt and fruit in the bowl, top with the dry ingredients and add enough milk to mix to your desired consistency or of course muesli mix first and top with yogurt and fruit, whichever way works best for you.

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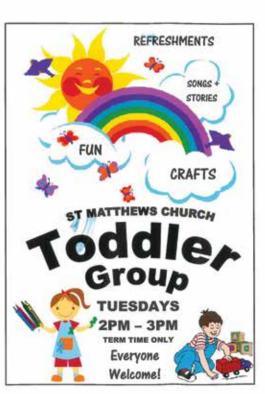

Julian Clark, Principle Dentist, said "Good oral health is vital for a healthy smile as well as a healthy body, and we'll be spreading that message throughout Smile Month."

Here are Julian's "Top Tips for Teeth"

- Brush your teeth twice a day with a fluoride toothpaste. Spit out after brushing, but do not rinse, so the fluoride stays on your teeth longer
- Wait for one hour after eating before brushing your teeth as some foods and drinks can make tooth enamel soft, and brushing could damage this protective coating
- Use interdental brushes or floss to clean between your teeth at least once a day
- Change your toothbrush every 3 months
- Cut down on sugary food and drinks between meals. To help your teeth to fight
 against decay, try to keep sugary foods and drinks to mealtimes and only have one
 snack a day
- Drink water, eat cheese, or chew sugar free chewing gum after meals to help neutralize acid attacks
- Visit your dentist regularly
- Be mouth aware. If you notice any changes such as lumps, red or white patches or mouth ulcers which do not heal in 3 weeks, visit your dentist
